Beware of those who use the truth to deceive. When someone tells you something that is true, but leaves out important information that should be included, he can create a false impression.

For example, someone might say, "I just won a hundred dollars on the lottery. It was great. I took that dollar ticket back to the store and turned it in for one hundred dollars!"

This guy's a winner, right? Maybe, maybe not. We then discover that he bought two hundred tickets, and only one was a winner. He's really a big loser!

He didn't say anything that was false, but he deliberately omitted important information. That's called a half-truth. Half-truths are not technically lies, but they are just as dishonest.

Untrustworthy candidates in political campaigns often use this tactic. Let's say that during Governor Smith's last term, her state lost one million jobs and gained three million jobs. Then she seeks another term. One of her opponents runs an ad saying, "During Governor Smith's term, the state lost one million jobs!" That's true. However an honest statement would have been, "During Governor Smith's term, the state had a net gain of two million jobs."

Advertisers will sometimes use half-truths. It's against the law to make false claims so they try to mislead you with the truth. An ad might boast, "Nine out of ten doctors recommend Yucky Pills to cure nose pimples." It fails to mention that they only asked ten doctors and nine of them work for the Yucky Corporation.

This kind of deception happens too often. It's a sad fact of life: Lies are lies, and sometimes the truth can lie as well.

The words "computer virus" call up a large number of upsetting images: crashed computers, lost data, crimes, painful hours in search of a cure. But the code itself is rather unimpressive to look at: it is just characters messed up together on a screen.

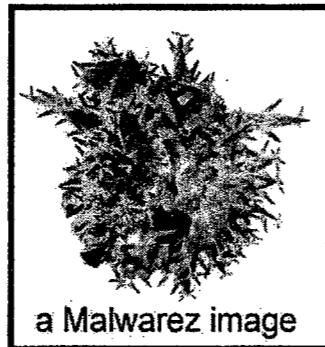
That was until Alex Dragulescu gave these always-hidden-behind human creations visual expression. The Romanian artist (and researcher at M.I.T. Media Lab) has created a series of computer-generated images he calls "Malwarez" that give three-dimensional life to computer worms, viruses, Trojans and spyware programs, many of which were on view courtesy of the antivirus company Symantec weeks ago on the sidelines of the RSA security conference in San Francisco.

The renderings sometimes evoke photographs of microscopic viruses that attack the human body, sometimes long and thin sea anemones that lie in wait deep underwater. But Mr. Dragulescu's creations do not exist in the physical world. They are visual imaginings built from the raw stuff of computer programming—disassembled code, API calls, memory addresses and subroutines.

He assigns these things a quality and uses their appearance and frequency in the code as inputs that he feeds into art-generating algorithms and computer models that spit out three-dimensional shapes with vivid colors.

As you can see from the attached image, the results actually make sinister, yet beautiful "artificial organisms" that do indeed evoke the worry which evil programs create in us, while also taking note of the immoral creativity of their makers.

People often wonder if dogs sniff out hidden drugs because they want to eat them, or because they're addicted to drugs themselves. In fact, the dogs have absolutely no interest in drugs. What they're actually looking for is their favorite toy. Their training has led them to associate that toy with the smell of drugs.

The toy used most often is a white towel. Police dogs love to play a vigorous game of tug-of-war with their favorite towel. To begin the training, the handler simply plays with the dog and the towel, which has been carefully washed so that it has no scent of its own. Later, a bag of marijuana is rolled up inside the towel. After playing for a while, the dog starts to recognize the smell of marijuana as the smell of his favorite toy. The handler then hides the towel, with the drugs, in various places. Whenever the dog sniffs out the drugs, he digs and scratches, trying to get at his toy. He soon comes to learn that if he sniffs out the smell of drugs, as soon as he finds them he'll be rewarded with a game of tug-of-war.

As training progresses, different drugs are placed in the towel, until the dog is able to sniff out a host of illegal substances. The same method is used for bomb-detection dogs, except various chemicals used to manufacture explosives are placed in the towel instead of drugs.

A story described in "Dogs On the Case," by Patricia Curtis, tells of a drug dog that was a little too eager for a game of tug-of-war. While walking along a line of cars waiting to enter the United States from Mexico, one of the dogs alerted to the smell of drugs, slipped her leash, and ran down the line of cars. Before her handler could find her,

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she came back into view, holding a large brick of marijuana in her jaws. Although the border patrol had no way to tell which car the drugs came from, the dog still got her tug-of-war. She did her job, and the drugs were off the street.
